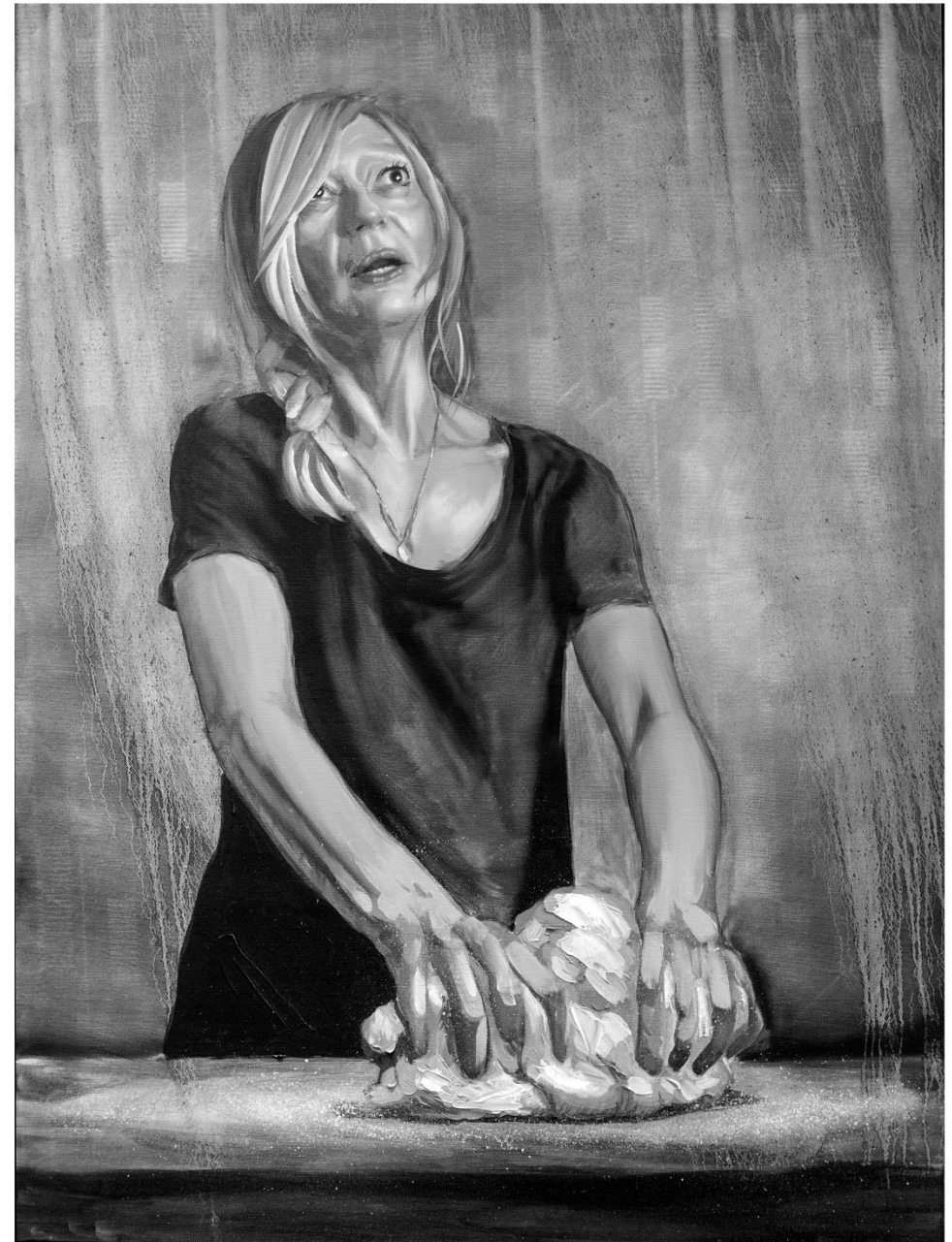
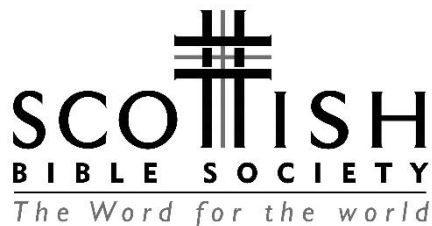
Iain Campbell is Artist-in Residence at St. George's Tron Church of Scotland. He is currently working on a 3-year project painting the Gospel of Luke.

# Luke 13: 18-21

## The parables of the mustard seed & the yeast

Then Jesus asked, 'What is the kingdom of God like? What shall I compare it to? It is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his garden. It grew and became a tree, and the birds perched in its branches.'

Again he asked, 'What shall I compare the kingdom of God to? It is like yeast that a woman took and mixed into about thirty kilograms of flour until it worked all through the dough.'
